

The Foundation provides over 50 scholarships and is responsible for the coordination of philanthropic and fundraising initiatives within the private sector and external support for the College's programs, students, faculty and staff. The mission of the Hocking College Foundation is to promote community awareness, build and nurture meaningful relationships, and connect community partners with giving opportunities that fulfill their philanthropic objectives while advancing the mission of Hocking College.









In addition to the scholarships that the Hocking College Foundation offers to eligible full-time new and returning students, the Foundation also collects applicants for a Student Financial Assistance Fund, and helps to provide financial assistance to students who may otherwise be at risk of dropping out of college due to an unexpected financial emergency. Unlike the scholarships, an application for Student Financial Assistance can be completed at any time while a student is enrolled at Hocking College, and can be used to pay for bills, medical expenses, or other unexpected financial responsibilities. With this fund, the Hocking College Foundation is able to fulfill its commitment to helping students complete their education despite the financial hardships that they might experience.

NEW PROGRAM AT HOCKING COLLEGE PARTNERS WITH EMPLOYERS TO BUILD A WORKFORCE





HOCKING COLLEGE SCHOOL OF WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT STUDENT PROJECTS AND ON-THE-JOB LEARNING

Hocking College is pleased to announce the launch of a new Workforce initiative which bridges the gap between local employers and competent, ready-to-work employees.

The initiative is titled Partnership for Advanced Community Engagement (PACE) and it operates as an Earn-and-Learn program which ties education and credentials to designated career paths and employers. With a focus on skills development, credentialing and career pathways, the earn-and-learn model encourages meaningful collaboration between employers, educators and workers. The model minimizes hiring risk for employers and increases efficiency in the workplace. Employees and students benefit from professional growth and wage gain opportunities as well as decreased educational debt loads.

The new program focuses on portable, nationally-recognized industry credentials in a flexible study program, for a variety of different workforce industries including HVAC, Water & Wastewater Management, Electrical, Culinary Arts, Construction and Automotive Technology. These programs will be available for students and employers to begin connecting to Hocking College in Spring 2022. To participate, students must be enrolled in one of the college's manufacturing, professional or technical & industrial programs.

According to the U.S. Department of Labor, successful earn-and-learn (apprenticeship) programs leverage five core components: business involvement, structured on-the-job training, related instruction, rewards for skill gains and a national occupational credential. Nationally recognized "Registered Apprenticeship" programs may be designated as time-based programs (requiring a number of hours of instruction and on-the-job training), competency-based programs (requiring skills competency and proficiency without a time requirement) or may be built using a hybrid approach (using a range of hours and measured competency). Earn-and-learn programming supports efforts to recruit, train, and retain skilled workers across a variety of industries.

Hocking College's PACE Earn-and-Learn Program is structured with flexibility to accommodate industry and student needs. For students, earn-and-learn programming

supports purposeful, cost-effective study while providing meaningful and skill-based experiences. Students receive a competitive wage and relevant experience while earning stackable, industry-recognized credentials. For employers, the program provides students who have already demonstrated basic technical knowledge, soft skills and leadership qualities to join their labor force straight away. Through their participation, employers support regional economic and workforce development initiatives, and talent pipelines are strengthened.

An additional facet of Hocking College's PACE program involves supporting pre-apprenticeship opportunities for those interested, including local high school students. Pre-apprenticeship is an opportunity to provide core training and basic technical and job readiness skills in preparation to enter a Registered Apprenticeship program. This added step in the educational offerings of Hocking College means that participating students can select a career path with greater confidence, having already gained the experiences and basic hands-on skills in that industry. The program, which offers direct employer connections to students and schools, also provides participants with even greater career and educational opportunities in the future, whether or not they choose to continue on to higher education.

Spearheading the PACE program at Hocking College is the Director of Workforce Innovation, Amanda Lemke.

Amanda Lemke came to Hocking College from a career in Government Communications and Community Affairs, where she led efforts for business advocacy and stakeholder collaboration first for the Canal Winchester Area Chamber of Commerce and then the City of Canal

In the Summer of 2020, Lemke was compelled to change her career path. She reflected that she "was looking for an opportunity to do something meaningful and impactful". She said: "As I researched opportunities, I came across Hocking College and as I learned more about the school and its mission, I felt compelled to become part of their team." In addition to developing plans and infrastructure for the college's new PACE program, Lemke is also responsible for promoting Workforce programming through participation with business consortiums, chambers of commerce, and similar organizations, coordinating with CCP director and TechPrep coordinator to enhance articulations agreements and alternative educational models and writing and editing content for the monthly School of Workforce Development Newsletter.

Lemke says that she likes seeking out opportunities for collaborative projects, as well as reviewing labor market data to assist the Dean of Workforce Development with departmental strategic planning. Lemke also savors any networking opportunities that come her way. In particular, she likes working with governmental agencies and industry partners.

Both students and employers will benefit from the partnerships and programs being developed through the efforts of Amanda Lemke and the School of Workforce Development team at Hocking College.



SEASONAL FESTIVITIES AT ROBBINS CROSSING



m extbf{K}}$ obbins Crossing Historical Village, located on the Hocking College campus, is holding another seasonal event - coming up December 10, 2021.


In October, Robbins Crossing held a Halloween Haunt event where local vendors and the Hocking College commuity came together to offer family-friendly crafts and activities, haunted ghost tours, food, games and more. The event was held on October 15-17, and turned up over 2,000 visitors from the local area and beyond. Next, Robbins Crossing is planning a Winter Holiday event in December.


Robbins Crossing is a historical village that reenacts what life was like in Southeastern Ohio from 1830 until 1880. Programming and events are hosted throughout the year, designed to share a love for Appalachian arts, crafts and culture. In addition to this year's inaugural Halloween event, some of the events held include blacksmithing workshops, basket weaving classes, hearth cooking and log cabin building techniques. The venue has also hosted concerts and performances, Hocking College Homecoming events, and Thunder in the Valley.

The upcoming event, planned and organized by Patrick Quackenbush, Program Manager of Parks and Museum Education, will be held on December 10, 2021 from 5:00-7:00 p.m. Some of the activities planned include festive games, cooking, crafts, and an educational tour of the historic village. Some activities may be held outdoors, and there will be short distances to travel between the historic cabins, so visitors are encouraged to dress appropriately for the weather.

In addition to being fun for the whole family, events at Robbins Crossing are educational. Visitors learn about the history and culture of Southeastern Ohio in the 1800s and get a glimpse into what life was like for the early settlers of the region. The village is staffed primarily by students of Hocking College's Parks and Museum Education Associate Degree program. At Robbins Crossing, these students have the opportunity to learn hands-on how to guide tours, re-tell history, and educate visitors in an engaging way. These skills translate directly to their future career paths in Parks and Museum Education: whether they plan to manage a museum or historical site or work at a public or private park. WOMEN'S FLAG FOOTBALL JOINS HOCKING COLLEGE ATHLETICS ROSTER

 $m H_{ocking}$ College will add Women's Flag Football to its ever-growing athletic department in Spring of 2022 after receiving a \$10,000 grant provided by the NJCAA Foundation, NFL FLAG, and RCX Sports. This addition marks the 13th varsity sport offered through the Hocking College Athletic Department.

"Women's Flag football will expand Hocking College's already robust offerings and provide more opportunities for women," said Dr. Betty Young, president of Hocking College. "College athletics, like high school athletics, teaches teamwork, develops a work ethic, keeps students engaged and on a pathway to graduate and enter the workforce." In March, the NJCAA first announced the \$150,000 grant, provided by the NFL, and the grant application process to support the initiative of expanding women's flag football.

"The NJCAA Foundation is passionate about the value women's flag football brings to institutions' overall growth, the student-athlete experience, and equality across playing fields," stated Brian Luckett, NJCAA Foundation Executive Director. "This is an opportunity for women of the association to compete at the highest level and we are fortunate to work hand in hand with NFL FLAG and RCX Sports during this exciting time."

RCX Sports, the official operating partner of NFL FLAG and the NAIA women's flag football initiative, works to enhance the youth sports experience for athletes all around the world. "RCX is dedicated to creating opportunities for all athletes to play and so that every child can gain important life skills only learned through sports," said RCX Sports CEO and NFL FLAG Executive Director Izell Reese. "Through NJCAA women's flag football, young women will not only be able to compete, but they'll also earn a valuable education that will set them up for success after college." Hocking College has become one of 11 NJCAA member colleges to receive the grant to ignite a women's flag football program and provide opportunities.

"The NJCAA expanding NFL Flag opportunities for female student-athletes at member institutions demonstrates clearly that football is for all," said Executive Vice President of NFL Football Operations Troy Vincent, Sr. "The values, fun and competitive environment of football can be enjoyed by anyone and everyone who wishes to participate. It is exciting to see junior colleges offer NFL FLAG as a varsity sport to female athletes." In February of 2021, the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) officially announced Women's Flag Football as an emerging sport in a joint effort with the National Football League (NFL) and Reigning Champs Experience (RCX). Hocking College is proud to announce they have been selected to grow women's flag football. Since Hocking College will be one of the first junior colleges in the country to offer women's flag football, the team will take on a wide range of opponents stretching all over the country. Look for them to be in action in the spring of 2022 and bring home victories to Nelsonville, Ohio.

HOCKING COLLEGE BASKETBALL SEASON UPDATES

The Hocking College Hawks Basketball Teams are starting their seasons strong, both winning their first games on the Hocking College Home Court on November 2, 2021.

The Men's Basketball team took off running in the 2021-2022 season, playing 8 games in their first 4 weeks! The Men's Basketball team won its first 6 games, including 3 home games and 3 away games. Across their first six games, they collectively scored 591 points, which places them third in the division for total points scored so far this season.

On November 8, Hocking College's Trevell Adams was named the OCCAC Player of the Week for the opening week of the season. Adams stuffed the stat sheet with 22.0 points, 4.0 rebounds, 3.7 assists and 1.4 steals per game during a 3-0 slate for the Hawks. He converted on 60% (27-45) of his shots, including a 50% (7-14) rate from beyond the 3-point line. Adams took care of the basketball as well, committing just four turnovers in 70 minutes played. In addition to that, he currently has a 4.0 GPA as a Fashion Design and Retail Merchandising major. He was also named to the OCCAC Preseason Newcomer of the Year list this season.

Men's and Women's Basketball will continue to play throughout the winter months, with another dual Home Game schedule on December 4, 2021 where Women's Basketball will play a home game at 1:00 p.m. and Men's Basketball will play a home game at 7:30 p.m. The first Conference games will begin in January for each team: both the Men's and Women's Conferences begin on January 8th with games against Owens Community College in Perrysburg, Ohio.

HOCKING COLLEGE FOUNDATION: COMMITTED TO GROWING CAREERS AND CHANGING LIVES

The Hocking College foundation hosts fundraising events each year, such as its annual Spring Gala which supports and raises money for scholarships and growth and initiative funds. For Homecoming in 2021, the Hocking College Foundation raised additional money for the Student Assistance Fund through its Homecoming Court selection process. For Giving Tuesday (November 30, 2021), The Foundation asked for donations from the community to support scholarships and student funds. In addition to these seasonal efforts, the Hocking College Foundation accepts donations all year. Contributors who donate a minimum annual amount are recognized as a Partner in Education, and Hocking College is thankful for their 2021 Partners in Education: G&J Pepsi, Park National Bank, Reed & Bauer, People's Bank, Snider Fuller and Stroh, GoodCare by CPCI and Vita Management.

Many of the Hocking College Foundation Scholarships are awarded to students without the need for additional application. To receive priority consideration for these scholarships, students need to complete their Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by the year's deadlines, as outlined in the academic calendar. For the 2022-2023 school year, new students must complete their FAFSA by February 15, 2022 and returning students must complete their FAFSA by March 31, 2022 to be considered for scholarships without additional application. Some of these scholarships include the Grizzly Scholarship, the John Light Scholarship, and the District Scholars Scholarship, along with several others.

Some Hocking College Foundation Scholarships do require additional application to be considered, and new and returning students should verify their eligibility for these scholarships and apply to earn additional funding towards their academic careers. One such scholarship is the Band and Choir Scholarship, which is awarded to one or more full-time students who join the Hocking College Singers or Hocking College Band and apply for the scholarship with a video audition. Additional scholarships which require application are the Davis S. Fraedrich Memorial Scholarship, the Patrick Gangwer Brewing Scholarship and the Presidential Scholar Award.

One scholarship from the Hocking College Foundation that does not require additional application is the R. Kenneth Kerr and Nada Jean Smith Family Scholarship which is awarded to a veteran or current military member at Hocking College. Formerly titled "The Kerr Family Scholarship", this gift was revised in 2019 and renamed the R. Kenneth Kerr and Nada Jean Smith Family Scholarship, in honor of both Kenneth Kerr's and Nada Jean Smith's ongoing mission to provide Hocking College Foundation with scholarship opportunities for over 50 years. The legacy of the family is rooted in Athens County, Ohio where they first managed the Kerr Family-Owned Pepsi Bottling Business, then sold the bottling company and began the Kerr Distributing Company (KDC). Courtesy of Mr. & Mrs. Kerr's generosity, the KDC began offering scholarships to the children of their locally-hired employees that allowed them to attend Hocking College. After the family sold the business, they made changes to the scholarship and opened it up to local veterans and military personnel. Today, the metaphorical torch that symbolizes Mr. & Mrs. Kerr's legacy of philanthropy has been proudly passed on to their children, Kenneth "Kenny" Kerr, III and Calista Jean Kerr Strickmaker. Mr. & Mrs. Kenneth Kerr, III and Mr. & Mrs. Ron Stickmaker currently serve as the donors of the R. Kenneth Kerr and Nada Jean Smith Family Scholarship.




