MUSTANG DISCOVERY GROUP VISITS HOCKING COLLEGE CAMPUS

T he Equine Program at Hocking College hosted a "Meet the Mustangs" Event, Demo, and Film Screening Tuesday, March 15, 2022 and Friday, March 18, 2022. Students, faculty, staff and the community learned more about mustangs, had the opportunity to see these horses up close, and saw a demonstration of what they can do.

Lisanne Fear and Hannah Catalino are the two women who have set out on a 5,000-mile discovery ride on the American Discovery Trail to inspire the adoption of 5,000 mustangs. The two met in 2014 during an extreme mustang makeover and became friends. They are passionate about mustangs and believe these horses deserve a loving home. Currently, there are 60,000 horses in holding pens. Their goal is to educate people on how incredible mustangs are and to inspire them to adopt one.

Lisanne Fear, a sixth-generation Wyomingite, grew up on a 55,000-acre cattle ranch and loves the outdoors. She is passionate about mustangs saying, "mustangs are incredible horses, good-hearted and kind." Fear states that training her first mustang, Phin taught her a lot about herself. She brought Phin on the discovery ride because he has a wonderful demeanor, he's steady, perfect for long rides, and he's the horse that lit the passion for these incredible creatures inside her. Mustangs have given Fear a purpose for her life. She believes in the "healing powers of equines, it's too immense not to be shared."

Hannah Catalino, is a professional horse trainer, specializing in liberty training, a type of training that doesn't use any ropes or reins. She's been working with horses since she was 17 when she started competing. Mustangs captured her heart, and she's been "forever branded." Working as a clinician, all around the world has been so rewarding for Hannah. She loves strengthening the bond between people and their horses.

A common misconception is that mustangs are a breed of horse. A mustang is just a wild free-roaming horse. The United States Government in 1971 decided that these horses needed to be protected and managed because they symbolize the history of the American West. The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is in charge of managing these horses. BLM has an adoption and incentive program to help give these animals a good home and more information can be found on their website, www.blm.gov.

FFA CLUB HOSTS STATE COMPETITIONS ON CAMPUS

The Future Farmers of America (FFA) is a national organization for youth and young adults to participate in agricultural and natural science education. The organization partners with high schools and colleges nationwide to provide valuable career development, personal growth and professional networking opportunities to students.

Hocking College has hosted a collegiate chapter of the Future Farmers of America organization since 2019 and has hosted the High School FFA State Forestry Competition in the past. This year, the college will be hosting the high school state Nature Interpretation Competition and the high school state Wildlife Management Competition on Saturday, April 2nd.

These competitive events run by the Ohio FFA are known as Career Development Events, or CDEs. They are meant to test the students on their knowledge and skills learned throughout their time in FFA, and also serve as networking opportunities where high school students can meet professionals working in their field. At the events hosted by Hocking College, students also gain valuable experience working alongside a collegiate FFA chapter and college faculty, to further advance their educational and professional careers.

After competing in the state competitions, the winners are invited to compete at the national

level during the National FFA Convention, and their experiences gained and feedback received from their time at the state level competitions will help them succeed at the national level.

Hocking College's collegiate chapter is excited to host the two state CDE competitions this April, and organization members have been helping to plan and prepare for the event for several months. In February, the student-lead FFA Club at Hocking College welcomed Ohio FFA Career Development Events Coordinator, Tom Ogleby, to their weekly club meeting to speak about event planning and coordination, and to inspire the college students in the organization to continue their careers in the fields of agriculture and natural sciences.


HOCKING COLLEGE HAWK CADEN COX IS KICKING DOWN BARRIERS

If you think of football, what comes to mind? Do you think of the athletes and the physicality needed to play the game? Or do you think about the hard work and determination teams put into training for a season? You probably wouldn't think about a person with Down Syndrome playing football, scoring points for their team, and in the process, making history. But that is exactly what Hocking College football player, Caden Cox did.

On September 11, 2021, during the third quarter of a home game against Sussex Community College, Caden was sent in to kick the extra point after the Hocking Hawks scored a touchdown. The team didn't realize Caden was kicking. Garrison Wheatly, the Offensive Lineman Long Snapper, was the only teammate that realized he was in. Wheatly snapped the ball, and Caden kicked a field goal scoring an extra point for his team. With that kick, he also made history as the first person with Down Syndrome to not only play in an NCAA or NJCAA college football game but also the first person with Down Syndrome to score a point.

His mom, Mari Cox, was in the stands that night cheering him on, and his dad, Kevin Cox, was the coach who sent him in. Caden had been super excited, ready for the chance to kick in a game. The Hawks Head Football Coach, Ted Egger, always believed Caden deserved to play football at Hocking College because he could kick.



Caden was born on June 7, 1999, with Down Syndrome. Mari and Kevin had learned their son would be born with Down Syndrome during an amniocentesis. Mari's first reaction was to figure out what it meant. Down Syndrome is the most frequently occurring chromosome disorder in the United States, causing intellectual and developmental delays. It affects close to 6,000 children yearly. People born with this genetic disorder have an extra chromosome, chromosome 21. To represent the disorder, all of Caden's football jerseys are number 21.

When Caden was little, his parents chose to focus on what Caden could do rather than what he couldn't do. He always did everything his older brother did, but without the anxiety or stress that sometimes people put upon themselves. Mari said when Caden did things, he went all in never self-conscious or worried about peer pressure.

His parents enrolled him in martial arts at two, and it quickly became his therapy. Over the years, Caden has participated in many extracurricular activities. He has a second-degree black belt in Taekwondo, many Special Olympic Medals, 8 State of Ohio Medals in swimming, he played percussion in band and was instrumental in starting the Inclusion Club at York High School in Yorktown, VA.

But everything wasn't always easy. Mari fought some battles to ensure that Caden had the same rights as others, even though he had a disability. She had to fight to keep him in their neighborhood school when school officials wanted to send him to a school for those with disabilities. She won, and Caden was able to attend the same school as his older brother.

So, when the Historian and Curator for the Chick-Fil-A College Football Hall of Fame, Jeremy Swick, reached out to Mari requesting Caden's uniform to display, Mari was super excited about this opportunity for her son. She began to see this attention as an opportunity to show more and more people what someone with a disability can do and the importance of inclusion.

Jeremy had volunteered with the organization Best Buddies throughout college, and that experience made a lasting impression on him. "Equity is something I truly believe in and now try to incorporate." He saw Caden's story, which spoke to him, and knew he wanted to include him in the Football Hall of Fame displays. Jeremy is "a firm believer that football accomplishments should be celebrated at all levels."



Over Spring Break of 2022, the Coxs went on a ten-day trip to Georgia, Louisiana, and Alabama. Their first stop was in Atlanta, Georgia, to view Caden's display at the Chick-Fil-A College Football Hall of Fame. As they walked in, they were immediately met, with a huge three-story wall of Helmets representing over 775 colleges. They then saw Caden's display front and center. The display holds his Hocking College number 21 football jersey, helmet, pants, cleats, socks, a Hocking College football, and a QR code, where people can click to watch the ESPN interview and story of how Caden made history.

While at the Football Hall of Fame, their entire family enjoyed the interactive displays, and Caden got to kick. Caden then went on to kick at Georgia Tech, the University of Alabama, and the University of Louisiana Monroe. He was also a guest of the University Georgia Baseball Coach for the rivalry game between the Georgia Bulldogs and Georgia Tech.


For Mari Cox, seeing her son's football uniform encased in plexiglass was a surreal experience. She shed some tears, as any parent might do, but for Mari, this proved to her again that she was right to not listen to the people who told her Caden would never graduate from high school or be able to do anything. Instead, she and her husband instilled in Caden that he needed to work hard and focus to achieve his goals. His next goal is kicking for Ohio State University.

Caden's story is impacting so many people around the world. Mari has received many messages through social media stating how Caden's story is inspiring them. She now wants to use this opportunity to bring awareness to advocacy and inclusion for those people with disabilities.

Everything that's been happening to Caden since he made history proved to Mari that she was right all those years ago when she chose to ignore the people who told her that Caden would never be able to do anything because he had Down Syndrome. Caden has proved that he is kicking down barriers and will continue to do so.

FREE AQUATIC **EDUCATION** AT HOCKING COLLEGE FISH HATCHERY

The Hocking College Fish Hatchery will be hosting a free community event centered around Aquatic Education. The event will include hands-on demos and interactive lessons on tools, equipment and knowledge used in the fields of fish management, aquaculture and environmental science. Participants will have the opportunity to learn about electroshocking - a tool used to temporarily stun fish for tagging, measuring and counting populations in a stream, which is an effective way of measuring a stream's ecosystem health and biodiversity. They will also be able to fish in the hatchery's stocked pond (fishing poles and all necessary supplies will be provided), participate in seining at the hatchery, and complete stream and water assessments for surrounding waterways.

The event will be held on Saturday, April 30, 2022 from 8:00 a.m. - 2:15 p.m. It is free for visitors of all ages to attend, and lunch will be provided. Early registration for the event is recommended, as space is limited and equipment use is first-come, first-served. Interested participants can register by filling out the form online at:

m T}$ he Tunnel to Towers Foundation is a charitable organization which honors military and first responders who make sacrifices to serve our country. They help to support the families of first responders who sacrificed their lives in the line of duty, and provide aid and support to first responders who have been injured or harmed in service to their country and their communities.

The organization raises funds by hosting 5k walks/runs across the country. In May 2022, Tunnel to Towers will be hosting a 5k event in Nelsonville, Ohio which will travel through the Nelsonville Historic Public Square and throughout Nelsonville. The funds raised support the building of adaptive homes for injured service members, providing mortgage-free homes to Gold Star Families with small children, and providing mortgage payoffs for first responders killed in the line of duty who leave behind a wife and small children.

The Nelsonville race coordinator is Lezlee Armes, who began working with the national Tunnel to Towers Foundation after her husband, Jeff Armes lost his life in the line of duty with the Nelsonville Division of Fire.

Hocking College has joined the Nelsonville Tunnel to Towers 5k walk/run as an event sponsor. The college will be represented by participating runners from our faculty, staff and student population in the school of Public Safety Services. Some of the participating runners are even planning to attend in their firefighting uniforms, which is encouraged by the Foundation.

The Nelsonville 5k event is open for anyone to participate, either remotely or in person. Registration is \$30 for adults or \$25 for first responders and military personnel. Youth registration is \$10 for children ages 12 and under and \$15 for children ages 13-17. All proceeds from the event go directly to the Foundation to continue its work of providing homes, resources and support for first responders and their families. Individuals can also choose to donate any amount to the organization, even if they don't intent to participate in the 5k event.

BASEBALL AND SOFTBALL UP O BAT IN CONFERENCE PLAY

The first-year Hocking College baseball team (3-4, 3-1) traveled to Sandusky, Ohio in March to take on the Lorain County Commodores (3-3, 1-3). This is the opening OCCAC Conference matchup. Due to field and weather conditions, game locations changed and the Hawks found themselves on foriegn soil but managed to come back home with three wins in four games.

The Hawks pitchers combined for 38 strikeouts on the weekend, 12 a piece coming from Freshman pitchers Nathan Simmons and Mason Ratcliff. They also beat up opposing pitchers from the plate, scoring 38 total runs on 34 hits. Freshman Blaine Rowlett hit the first home run in Hocking College baseball history in the Hawks thrilling 20-16 win over the Commodores on Saturday. Pitchers Ratcliff and Simmons picked up their first Wins of the season, along with fellow teammate Wes Carpenter.

Hocking College will travel to Perrysburg, OH on Saturday (3/26) to take on the Owens Community College Express in a Double Header, then return on Sunday (3/27) and welcome Owens in a home double header, held at Logan High School. Games can be followed live via the Gamechanger app.

The first-year Hocking College softball team (7-2, 4-0) opened up OCCAC Conference play for the first time, traveling to Lorain County (0-4, 0-4) for a pair of double headers. While field locations and weather were possible issues, the Hawks were able to find a way to come home with four wins.

The Hawks started slow in the first game, winning by the score of 1-0, but came alive in the next three as they scored a total of 47 runs. They also tallied 55 hits, 20 coming in the final 17-9 victory on Saturday. The Hawks also held the Commodores to 17 total runs, keeping them scoreless in the first two games of the weekend. Erika Bowman and Andee Lester both collected 2 wins a piece on the mound, while striking out a total of 27 batters.

The Hawks will Travel to Perrysburg, OH on Friday (3/25) for a Double Header with the Owens Community College Express. They will then welcome the express at home on Sunday (3/27), held at Logan High School. Games can be viewed live via the Gamechanger app.
