 ${f O}$ n June 8, 2022, Hocking College was presented with the Tree Campus designation by the Arbor Day Foundation once again. Bryn Stepp, Manager of Regional Affairs, SE Ohio Regional Liaison for Lt. Governor Jon Husted visited the Hocking College campus to present the award.

Hocking College was first awarded Tree Campus status in 2014, and maintained that status through 2017. In 2020, Dale Hatfield, Forest and Tree Care Manager at Hocking College and his colleagues resubmitted the application to obtain Tree Campus status, and successfully earned the designation for the year 2020. Included on the tree advisory committee at Hocking College are students, staff and faculty who are passionate about caring for the trees and grounds on campus.

The Tree Campus Higher Education program honors colleges and universities for effective campus forest

management and engaging staff and students in conservation goals. Hocking College achieved the title by meeting Tree Campus Higher Education's five standards, including maintaining a tree advisory committee, a campus tree-care plan, dedicated annual expenditures for its campus tree program, an Arbor Day observance and a student servicelearning project. The Tree Campus Higher Education program was started in 2008 by the Arbor Day Foundation, and there are currently 411 campuses across the United States with this recognition.

HOCKING COLLEGE HOSTS OHIO SCIENCE EDUCATORS AT THE SECOND NATURAL RESOURCES

 \mathbf{F} or the second year in a row, Hocking College hosted a Natural Resources Educator Workshop, designed for science educators in the state of Ohio to gain information, obtain lesson plans, and be inspired through educational programming at Hocking College. The three-day program ran from June 21-23, and the educators who participated learned about a variety of topics in the world of natural resources, including ornithology, forestry, herpitology, agroecology, ichthyology, law enforcement in the outdoors, and more. Through each lesson taught by Hocking College professors in their respective fields, the participants obtained lesson plans, educational materials and resources that they could take back to their own classrooms to inspire the next generation of science students through hands-on learning.

Participants who attended also participated in outdoor recreational activities on Hocking College's campus locations, including paddleboarding at Lake Snowden and educational evening hikes around the Nature Center - both of which are live learning labs for Hocking College's Parks and Museum Education program. The educators also earned Continuing Education Units (CEUs) for their attendance in the workshop, which goes towards their teaching license renewal requirements.

Jim Harding, program manager for Forest Management spearheaded the campaign to create an event like the Natural Resources Educator Workshop to Hocking College. With the support of his colleagues and dean Dan Kelley, Harding was able to plan and execute a successful first workshop in 2021. Harding says that he wanted to create this opportunity for Ohio science educators in order to build relationships with high schools and career centers. As a program manager, he would visit high schools to speak with students about offerings and educational programs at Hocking College; while he was there, he realized that although he gets to spend only 40-50 minutes with the high school students, their teachers spend several hours a day with them each year. With that in mind, he started building an educational program that the teachers could attend over the summer, which provided tools and lesson plans that they could take back to their classrooms - the outcome of which means more teachers (and therefore, more students) who know about Hocking College and the valuable programs that it offers, and more opportunities for Ohio teachers to earn continuing education credits through fun, hands-on learning experiences.

Harding has more plans for next year's workshop. Since many of the teachers who participated this year and last are excited to come back year after year, Harding and the other Natural Resources faculty are planning to offer a wider variety of lessons next year, and provide even more opportunities for hands-on learning through Hocking College's spacious and diverse outdoor campus locations.

PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT

HOCKING COLLEGE FISH HATCHERY AT LAKE SNOWDEN EARNS GRANT FOR UPDATES

T he Hocking College Fish Hatchery, located at Lake Snowden in Albany, Ohio, operates year-round, raising different fish to educate students in the Fish Management and Aquaculture Science program, and as of March 2021, also selling fish. Students gain experience raising and spawning several species such as sunfish, bass, koi, catfish, tilapia, paddlefish, trout, and coho salmon.


Students get hands-on experience with these species for the aquaculture courses while also learning how to manage them in the wild during their fish management courses. The fish hatchery has a diverse range of species on purpose; students experience the challenges of raising tilapia through the winter while also learning how to raise trout through the hot summer months. Students not only learn how to raise, spawn, diagnose illnesses and manage the fish species found in the fish hatchery, but they also learn how to identify and manage fish species in the wild not raised in hatcheries. Students also learn the rules and regulations in each state regarding the specific species of fish allowed across the country.

The fish hatchery has eight active ponds, each about a 1/2 acre in size; they also have over 10,000 gallons of water capacity for raceways in the indoor portion of the fish hatchery.

During our courses, students sample rivers and streams using electro-fishing gear such as backpack shockers, barge shockers, and the shock boat. They also use hoop nets, gill nets, seines, and other sampling methods applied for fish management. This program is a hands-on approach to fish management and aquaculture education that helps our students to achieve their goals as future biologists and aquaculturists.

In March 2021, the hatchery began to sell fish. With this excellent opportunity, students gain experience making recommendations to customers, checking on permitted species for different areas of the country, learning everything they need to transport and deliver fish safely, and collecting payments.

Hocking College recently received a grant for updates to the fish hatchery. They plan to build a 40 x 120 building with a new classroom, office, and bathrooms. These new areas

will support the education students receive at the fish hatchery. The new facility will have state-of-the-art nanobubble technology. This technology increases the condition of water in which fish are grown in, allowing more fish to be in smaller amounts of water.

There are also plans to experiment with aquaponics, which is a system that allows fish and plant production to be combined. The fish hatchery plans to place a 144-foot greenhouse over a decommissioned underground tank that is 15 feet deep and holds about 500,000 gallons of water. They plan to raise lettuce as well as salmon using aquaponics.


They also will be installing liners for five of the ponds. These will help keep pond nuisances under control while growing different species of fish. These improvements continue to support this field and the students who participate in the Fish Management and Aquaculture Science program.

STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN HANDS-ON LEARNING AT CANADA FIELD SCHOOL

Hocking College has returned to Canada for its 26th trip to the Haliburton Forest for the annual Canada Field School program. The School of Natural Resources has held a long-standing partnership with the Canadian National Forest, and students are back in the woods once again after a 2-year hiaitus caused by COVID.

This year, the group of students is being led Grant Scholten, Program Manager of Fish Management & Aquaculture Science; Homer Elliot, Wildlife Management faculty; and Ronald Cass, Natural Resources Biology faculty.

While at the forest, students participate in field research including lake and river surveys, animal tagging and tracking, plant and tree health, and more. The majority of the students participating this year are Wildlife Resources Managament majors, but the summer learning program covers topics from Environmental Science, Forest Management, and Fish Management & Aquaculture Sciences.



This year, the educational summer program is being offered to students as a Certificate, called the Natural Resources Field School Certificate this makes it eligible for some types of financial aid, which allows more students to participate. The certificate will also be reflected on students' resumes and transcripts, which demonstrates to potential employers or universities (for those students who are transferring to 4-year programs) that they have gained supplementive field experience before graduating, something that is usually not possible in the timeline of a two-year program.

Also included in the field experience is public education: on June 28th, the students taught a lesson at the Haliburton National Forest on "The Health of Local Lakes and their Fish", where they present data collected over the 25+ years of research that Hocking College students have collected. Students and staff from this trip will return in July, and bring back additional presentations to campus for their fellow students and colleagues.
